



4. HUXLEY HALL

Over the last 68 years, Huxley Hall has appeared on the House and Garden Tour only twice, the last time being 1965. Huxley Hall shows the evolution of a fine Shenandoah Valley home in its stone and brick construction. The house borders Tuscarora Creek with a lovely expanse of lawn running down to the banks of the stream.

The original stone section of the house was built in 1782 by Captain John Kerney, an American Revolutionary soldier, who engaged in the American service in July 1775. At the end of the Revolutionary War, he returned to Berkeley County to live.

Upon entering the house, hand painted wallpaper treatments adorn the front hall and continue to the upper floors. A three story open staircase rises from the first floor to the third where an additional bedroom is located. Often referred to as the “Dormitory” this room served as the bedroom for the three sons of the most recent owner. A large open fireplace adds great charm to the new modern country kitchen in the older stone portion of the house. A stone smokehouse sits just outside the kitchen door.

In May 2009, The National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century, Sir George Calvert Chapter, Maryland, recognized the historical significance of Huxley Hall. Likewise, Huxley Hall is recognized as a Berkeley County Historic Landmark.

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



1. THE SECRET GARDEN

518 S. Samuel Street, Charles Town, WV 25414

Located in downtown Charles Town, the home was built in 1935 on the original land of the McCurdy farm. From the outside, the house may look like a small, charming stucco home. However, over the years, each of the owners have added their own touch; including, a large two-story addition, screen porch, and remarkable interior styling while preserving the original detail through each modification. As one walks through the house admiring the art, antiques, beautiful wall colors, and William Morris wallpaper, the master staircase in the formal living room will lead to a hallway where another staircase will provide access to the surprise of a renovated attic designed by the owner. After touring the second floor, the back staircase will lead to the family room, which accesses the screen porch, deck, and back stairs. The Secret Garden surrounds a stone fishpond and brick patio.

The amazing landscaping throughout the entire property was done exclusively by the current owner who is a Master Gardner. So, too, was the interior painting and wallpaper. Lastly, the garage was designed and constructed by the present owner a few years ago, which adds a cottage appearance to the house.

2. ROSE HILL FARM

Rose Hill Farm sits gracefully atop a knoll in Jefferson County, West Virginia, where sweeping pastures, native gardens, and restored outbuildings reflect centuries of thoughtful stewardship. Originally part of a Lord Fairfax land grant, the property today includes an historic dairy barn, cultivated kitchen gardens, and a beautifully restored hay barn now used for events.

At its heart is the Rose Hill farmhouse, a two-story brick home built circa 1835 beside an earlier log dependency from around 1795. Together, they reflect a classic frontier progression—from a modest log dwelling to a more refined brick residence in the Greek Revival style, marked by symmetrical façades, fine brickwork, and deep-set windows.

In 2015, a sensitive restoration enhanced the farmhouse's livability while honoring its history. Original features such as marbleized stair risers, acorn newels, paneled doors, and mantels were preserved, allowing the home's craftsmanship to shine. The result is an interior that feels both timeless and alive—where early American artistry meets modern comfort.

Rose Hill Farm was listed on the National Register of Historical Places on May 18, 1990. It remains a place for gathering, reflection and celebration.



3. THE FITZ

909 West King Street, Martinsburg, WV 25401

The Fitz, 909 West King St., Martinsburg, WV, is a Georgian Revival brick home, built in 1925, located in the Boom Town Historic District of Martinsburg, WV, and is half a mile from the Town Square. The single family home is built of locally sourced brick with pedimented dormers and features Chinese Chippendale balustrade atop the front porch and a classical entry with side lights and an elliptical fanlight over the front door. The port cochere, attached to the west of the house, is an open arbor on square brick columns. Additionally, the roof timbers are decoratively treated with shaped ends. The Fitz sits on a 0.52 acre lot of mature trees and a fenced backyard. The home has a spacious living room with a fireplace, a formal dining room with a decorative ceiling, a built-in, glass-fronted china hutch, a newly remodeled kitchen whose updating preserved the original blue and white tiled floor with a compass pattern, a roomy family room, five large bedrooms, and three and a half baths, all with original hardwood or ceramic tile floors, totaling 3,477 square feet of living space. The wide main staircase encompasses a midway landing that features four beautiful vertical stained glass windows. The first and second floors and the back yard will be shown.

The Fitz was purchased by its current owner in March 2025, and they are making extensive updates, repairs, and restoration to preserve the original beauty of the home while providing modern amenities.
